Making Faith Your Own

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Introduction: It is a common problem for Christians to accept things as true without really testing them, that is to make them part of their own faith.

- A. More and more I am hearing of Christians who go to a denomination or become involved with new movements under the name "church of Christ."
 - 1. It is not uncommon to hear those make comments that "I used to believe this, but I never was challenged to test it."
 - 2. The problem is one that is more prevalent amongst young people, but I am finding more adults making drastic changes because they were never grounded.
 - 3. The real tragedy comes when they accept something else just because it is different and still are unwilling to have the openness to have that new belief tested as well!
- B. There is only one kind of heart that will find God's truth and be saved. (Jn 3:19-21)
 - 1. Jesus challenged the Jews to test themselves and find the truth. (Jn 8:32; 7:17)
 - 2. Truth has not changed nor the way to find it.
 - 3. Satan also has deceitfully placed deadly error before Christians for centuries and called it truth. He, however, does not want it to be tested at all.

(2 Cor 11:14-15; 1 Jn 4:1)

4. It is crucial that each one be grounded in the truth of God. (**Eph 4:14-15**)

I. How to know when you have made faith your own.

- A. It can be defended. (1 Pt 3:15; Jude 3)
 - 1. How many have avoided talking to their friends about the Bible?
 - 2. In that isolation you may never be tested! When we share the gospel with others, we are benefited too. (Ex. Young people study on Calvinism.)
- B. We base our lives upon it. (2 Cor 1:24; 1 Jn 5:4)
 - 1. It is the wisdom and the warnings from God's word that blesses us. (1 Jn 5:3)
 - 2. When others misrepresent what we stand for as "traditional" or "blindly following church of Christ opinions," we know better!
- C. We will stand for it. (1 Cor 16:13)
 - 1. Some of the strongest attacks will come because you will not have fellowship with those who have gone beyond the scriptures. (Ex. My father and instrumental music)
 - 2. Even as a non-Christian I knew that if I could get someone who claimed to be a Christian to go along with me, that he really had no convictions, just talk.
- D. It becomes a part of us! (2 Cor 4:13-14)

II. Why some people have problems developing their personal faith.

- A. Because of the natural doubts that go from being a child to being an adult.
 - 1. As a child we believe certain things because our parents taught us. (Ex. Is there a God?)
 - 2. It is not uncommon when one is faced with others who have a different belief to conclude that everyone is influenced by their upbringing and there is no "absolute truth."

- 3. It is possible to have a genuine faith given by godly parents and also wrong views given by parents. (2 Tim 1:5; Mt 10:34-38)
- 4. If truth is the issue, them what is right can be found.
- B. Because of the guilt associated with doubts.
 - 1. Sadly we may reinforce this guilt by our impatience. (Ex. They have been in church for years and should know this!")
 - 2. The Pharisees used pride and intimidation to line others up with them. (Jn 7:45-52)
 - 3. We know far less than we think. It is high time for us to be honest and let our guilt lead us to seek for the truth. Do you fear questions?
- C. Because we have never learned to trust God.
 - 1. This is the first step in coming to know anything else! (Heb 11:6; 1 Cor 8:1-3)
 - 2. Many have sought out answers to issues before ever yielding their hearts to God. What does it mean to trust God?

III. Things to remember while making faith your own.

- A. Avoid the emotional response to run and hide.
 - 1. Some when they decide what is right will often run and hide from others who may have a different view.
 - 2. Remember that truth can be examined. Why should you refuse to discuss it?
 - 3. The false teacher will actively work to subvert your faith and then cut you off from those who may disagree. Satan is pleased with this kind of "faith." (Gal 4:16-17)
- B. Do not make sweeping generalizations.
 - 1. There are two wrong reactions when you find yourself in error.
 - a. To blindly accept everything another tells you.
 - b. To blindly set aside everything you have learned.
 - 2. Do not in pride think you are the first to discover new truths and that everyone else in the church is blind. (1 Cor 8:1-3)
 - 3. We need to learn patience with ourselves and with others. (Jas 5:9-11)
- C. Do not flee from the struggle for truth. (**Rom 12:1-2**)
 - 1. The struggle for truth is a daily one. If for no other reason than the danger of my heart becoming corrupted and I then become self-deceived. (Mt 13:13-15)
 - 2. I need the wisdom to find godly council. (**Prov 24:5-6**) (This does not mean that you follow them blindly)
- D. Pray to God for wisdom and serve Him with the knowledge you have. (Jas 1:5-8)
 - 1. Always serve God vigorously while seeking His will. It is folly to sit and study and do nothing else.
 - 2. Wisdom takes time. There are great truths that you keep learning throughout life. (**Eph 3:16-19**)

Conclusion: Where is your faith?

- A. If we could humbly see where we really are then God can do something with us. (Mk 9:23-24)
- B. It is best to know so that we may powerfully serve God.
